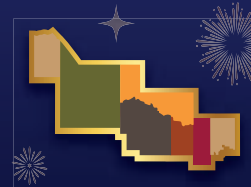

GRIC Leadership Attend Inauguration for Gov. Hobbs

Gov. Lewis Leads Tribal Prayer for Swearing In

Thursday, Jan. 5, 2023, thousands of honored guests, sup-

porters, and Arizonans flooded the Arizona Capitol lawn for the inauguration ceremony for newly elected Arizona Gov. Katie

Hobbs. Dozens of tribal leaders and representatives from Arizona's 22 tribal nations also attended the ceremony, where GRIC Gov. Stephen Roe Lewis provided a tribal blessing for the occasion.

In addition, Superintendent Tom Horne, Treasurer Kimberly Yee, Attorney General Kris Mayes, and Secretary of State Adrian Fontes took their oath of office during the inauguration.

"I believe that now is the perfect time to move past division and partisanship and return to a path of cooperation and progress," said Gov. Katie Hobbs in her address. "I believe in the future of our state, and I'm excited about what's possible if we work together to do what we've been elected to do."

Arizona Gov. Hobbs will serve as the 24th governor of Arizona, the first Democrat to serve as governor in 16 years, and the fifth female governor elected.

During his remarks, Gov. Lewis asked for blessings of confidence and courage for Gov. Hobbs and the newly elected officials in

TED College Visits Inspire Next Generation GRIC Scholars

Gila River Indian Community's Tribal Education Department's (TED) K-12 Program has begun an initiative to encourage more students to pursue higher education.

Lance Reyna, Ted's K-12 Education Manager, said schooling after high school isn't as common and he's looking to help change that through the initiative.

"My goal like the rest of our leaders, is to help equip our students with the skills needed to come and work for their community in all positions in the future," said Reyna, who believes more exposure to postsecondary schools will assist.

Only 24 percent of 18-24-year-old Native American students are enrolled in college compared to 41 percent of the overall U.S. population, according to data from the Postsecondary National Policy Institute in 2021.

Ted's Student Services Program offers several scholarships for higher education to enrolled GRIC members, providing them

with financial assistance toward a certificate, diploma, or degree at any accredited college or university.

Reyna has been collecting

promotional items from postsecondary schools such as T-shirts, hats, pennants, posters, and more to expose students to the many opportunities available to them.

"As a goal I wanted to really push out our in-person visits, guest speakers, and college swag items to our students and community. I want to hype up education

and make it exciting," said Reyna, who often distributes the collected items out during events and as motivational prizes for students.

As part of the initiative, over 100 students have been visited by various college representatives who come out to GRIC schools sharing what programs are being offered and to answer any questions students might have.

Additionally, campus tours have been arranged for students to see firsthand what opportunities and services are available, including those specific to Native Americans that offer academic counseling and support services.

Reyna says the student's response has been positive, "I think it has helped to open student's eyes to the opportunities that are available to them. It's one thing to read about a college, or hear a speaker come in and talk about the campus, but to actually experience it, I can see the students get excited as they visualize themselves walking through campus."

In November and December

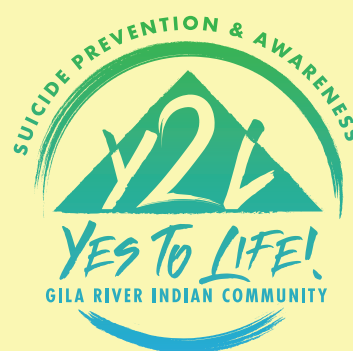

AOPPYC Community Clean Up Efforts Continue

The Akimel O’odham/Pee-Posh Youth Council (AOPPYC) resumes clean ups throughout the Community. Beginning in District 1 on Saturday, Nov. 5, AOPPYC members, advisers, and volunteers gathered trash in the area while also assisting elders with yard maintenance.

They collected over 30 bags of trash that day. GRIC’s Department of Rehabilitation and Supervision staff also assist AOPPYC with cleaning and hauling away garbage bags and any large debris.

“It’s good just to maintain the Community and what we have, and to preserve what we want, keep it clean and for the wildlife in the area,” said AOPPYC member Tizoc Ayala, District 1.

Ayala says cleaning will also help prevent any animals from possible illness. While cleaning in District 1, most of the trash found had been torn apart and chewed up by dogs and wildlife.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the AOPPYC held regular Community clean ups, open to anyone who’d like to assist.

“I’m happy that we’re doing them again, it’s fun to have other people that aren’t on youth council, come out and interact with us and help us beautify the Community,” said AOPPYC member Junior Pancott, District 2, “We use to have a lot turn out, and slowly we’re starting to see those numbers come out again.”

On Saturday, Dec. 17, the AOPPYC continued the clean up events in District 2, picking up trash and debris along the roadways of Hasan Kehk and Mish Ki.

“A lot of traffic comes through here, these are the main roads so I think that it’s good to have a clean Community,” said Charity Marquez, AOPPYC member and District 2 resident.

Marquez joined youth council over a year ago and enjoys putting together events for members of the AOPPYC and Community.

“It makes me feel good as a person too,” she said, “It’s good to see people come out, who aren’t members of youth council. It’s something that everyone can do.”

AOPPYC shared that they are always open to suggestions from

GILA RIVER INDIAN COMMUNITY COVID-19 VACCINE INCENTIVE PROGRAM FOR COMMUNITY MEMBERS - MINORS

DEADLINE IS MARCH 31, 2023

Vaccine incentive is now available for any minor Community member (ages six (6) months through seventeen (17) years) who has become fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

*Individuals are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after they receive their second dose of the vaccine in a 2-dose primary series or two weeks after receiving a single-dose primary series.

Payments will be made once the application is received and verified by the Per Capita Office.

During the last few weeks of the year, students are out of school for winter break. While the time away from school is nice, sometimes youth can find themselves bored at home. Thankfully, this winter break, the Tribal Recreation and Wellness (TRW) Brown Performance Strength & Conditioning (BPSC) partnered for a three-day multisports camp for youth.

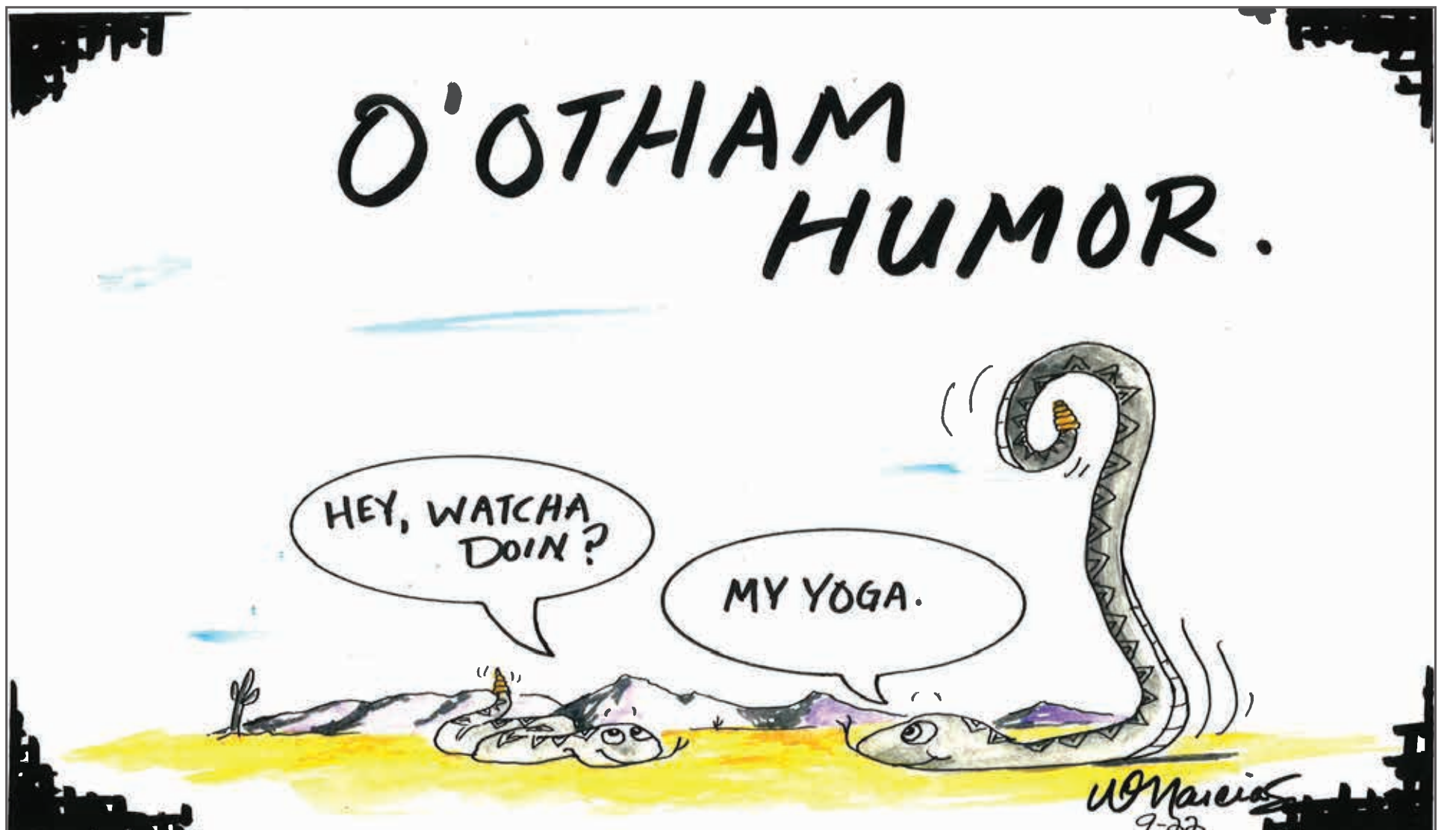
For three days, Dec. 27 to 29, youth of all ages participated in three camps focused on various sports, conditioning, agility, athleticism, and endurance at the District 3 Multipurpose Building Gymnasium. "In 2022 we offered a variety of new sports clinics and camps so wanted to keep youth active during their winter break," said Angel Orque, TRW Recreation Manager. "We understand that everyone, not just youth aren't as active this time of

year, so it was important to keep everyone active by utilizing our partnership with BPSC and the different sports they've introduced to the Community." This multiday, multisport camp was a first for TRW. Orque shared that upon sharing the flyer, they filled out the registration within the first two days with youth from GRIC. The draw was an "eye-opening" opportunity and accomplishment for TRW staff. "The demand is there

from the Community and our youth have shown a great interest in learning new sports and building upon these camps," said Orque. The first day focused on flag football, the second provided basketball training, and the third emphasized physical activity through various endurance and coordination activities applicable to any sport. Each day over 30 youth attended each camp, many returning for all three days. As in the past, Arizona

Rattlers quarterback Drew Powell joined on the first day to provide some instruction and motivation during the flag football camp. "The camp was all about keeping children active while having fun, especially during this time while they're on break," said Maurice Brown of BPSC. "We've seen so much growth in the children, during our time here, so it's been great to see their enthusiasm around learning new sports and allowing us to coach them and provide them the best guidance and mentorship we can." Maurice and his brother Ryan are the co-founders of BPSC and thanked the Community for allowing them to work with the youth. Both commend TRW for being innovative in working with youth throughout 2022. Lanessa Felix's attended the second and third-day camps. Felix was happy that

her son, Jordan, was allowed to participate. "We live off the Community in Casa Grande so it was a great way for my son to stay active and interact with other Native youth here." In addition, her son is an avid basketball player, so he was excited to work on his basketball skills. Like Felix, Marliissa Morris' son attended the camps and past flag football camps. Her son Caleb is an experienced baseball player but enjoyed learning flag football and basketball at the camp. "My son is an only child, so the camps are great for him to get to know other youth in the Community," said Morris. "He's also pre-diabetic so it's very important that he's regularly active so these camps are a great for him and the others here today and I appreciate what TRW is doing for the kids."

Roderick and Rodriguez provided introductory lessons on country two-step, bachata and waltz to father/daughter and mother/son duos of all ages.

"It was awesome. This is primarily for beginners and people who are just trying to learn something new," said Roderick.

A young participant who attended with his mother said, "It was pretty fun, even though I don't like dancing that much." The family said they're

facing future challenges and obstacles.

“Give them the ancient wisdom of our combined common belief in peaceful partnerships and of working for the common good, in mutual respect for our difference and for the connections that bind us,” said Gov. Lewis. “Strengthen their resolve to protect our sacred resources, our lands, our precious religious sites, and our precious water.”

Gov. Lewis referenced his necklace adorned with

a small gourd of water and declared water as a resource that “connects us all and is the necessary connection that binds us now and into the future.” His remarks also served as a land acknowledgment referencing Phoenix as the ancestral homelands of the O’otham and Pee Posh.

“Today the atmosphere was great and showed a great sense of unity, I loved the speeches made by everyone and hearing the commitments and dedications expressed by the newly elected leaders,” said

Lt. Gov. Monica Antone. “I was very excited to be here today, hear the blessing by Gov. Lewis, welcome the new administration and I look forward to see how they’ll work to make our state better.”

GRIC member Adrian D Thomas, District 5, also performed a song on a Native American flute at the conclusion of the inauguration. His music primed the audience for a special performance by Indigenous Enterprise, who performed various powwow dances for the audience.

Gov. Hobbs has included members of Arizona’s tribal nations as part of her transition team and has pledged to work for their priorities as Gov. Since over a quarter of the state’s land is tribal land, tribal inclusion will be vital for Gov. Hobbs moving forward.

“Let me say unequivocally to every elected official here today that if you’re ready to make real progress on the issues that matter most to the people of this state, then my door will always be open,” said Hobbs.

More than 850 Families Get Special Deliveries for Christmas

Gila River Indian Community's Department of Community Housing (DCH) and the Gila River Police Department (GRPD) ensured that 856 children and their families throughout the Community received Christmas gifts last Dec.

First, GRPD collected donations for children

at their facility in Sacaton for DCH to deliver to the children and families they serve, an annual tradition. An added treat is that the gifts arrived for children just in time for Christmas.

Then on Thursday, Dec. 22, families who enrolled in DCH's Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) received a special visit from Lt. Gov. Monica

Antone.

Lt. Gov. Antone, Amber Martinez, Housing Specialist for DCH, and Ben Notah, Assistant to Lt. Gov. Notah, packed an SUV, and traveled to Casa Grande and Chandler to spread some holiday cheer to families.

On this day, Lt. Gov. Antone presented toys for

children of all ages. Items included notebooks, sketchpads, markers, paint, headphones, gift cards, and more to over 30 children, teens, and families temporarily housed through ERAP. In total, they served over 78 children.

ERAP, a temporary federal assistance program, was established to offer rental or utility assistance

to eligible renters whom the COVID-19 pandemic has severely impacted.

"The great part of presenting a gift is witnessing their eyes light up, and seeing the huge smiles on their faces was a good feeling," said Lt. Gov. Antone. "It was important for me to make them feel important by giving them gifts."

Lt. Governor would

like to thank those who donated towards this effort, including Pimmex Contracting, Toys for Tots, and the Executive offices for all the donations to make this happen. She also wanted to thank Tribal Council and Treasurer Gary Mix Jr. and DCH for extending the ERAP program. ERAP lasted two years, ending on Dec. 29, 2022.

SLA Rolls Out Donations for GRIC Youth

Seven Layer Army Skateboards (SLA) kicked off the new year by distributing skateboarding items for Community youth and aspiring skateboarders. Both co-founders Reuben Ringlero and Paul Molina hosted a "skate giveaway" at the District 3 skatepark in Sacaton Wednesday, Jan. 4.

Over 80 people arrived at the skatepark for the 3 p.m. distribution, an outstanding amount considering the flyer and outreach went out less than 24 hours before. And within an hour of starting, all of the items were gone.

"This giveaway represents the largest donations for us ever. It's very exciting. We've never had this many people come out for a giveaway like this," said Reuben Ringlero. Items included complete skate decks, new shoes, and bare

skate decks.

A deck (board) can cost up to \$70, so these donations will go a long way to helping youth who want to learn. The items were provided through generous contributions from Cowtown Skateboards' "Cowtown Skate" and Phoenix's "Skate After School" non-profit organizations.

Since starting in 2008, SLA's goals have been to provide skateboard competitions and giveaways to motivate a healthy lifestyle for GRIC youth. Since then, SLA has become active in the Community and throughout the valley and has established notable partnerships with numerous skate organizations that support their efforts.

Last year SLA hosted the "Downtown Throwdown" skate competition in Downtown Phoenix in conjunction with the Indigenous Peoples' Day celebration in Oct. This competition was one of the most significant and notable events they hosted for Native skateboarders. Additionally, it demonstrated how much support they've developed in the skateboard community.

"I skated as a kid and never had anything like this giveaway available so I hope that this motivates our youth to discover skateboarding, continue skating, so doing these events feels great," said Ringlero.

As SLA marks its 15th year, they hope to continue providing skate competitions throughout the year, especially since a hiatus due to the pandemic. Before that

time, SLA hosted an average of four skate competitions a year and looks forward to what 2023 will bring.

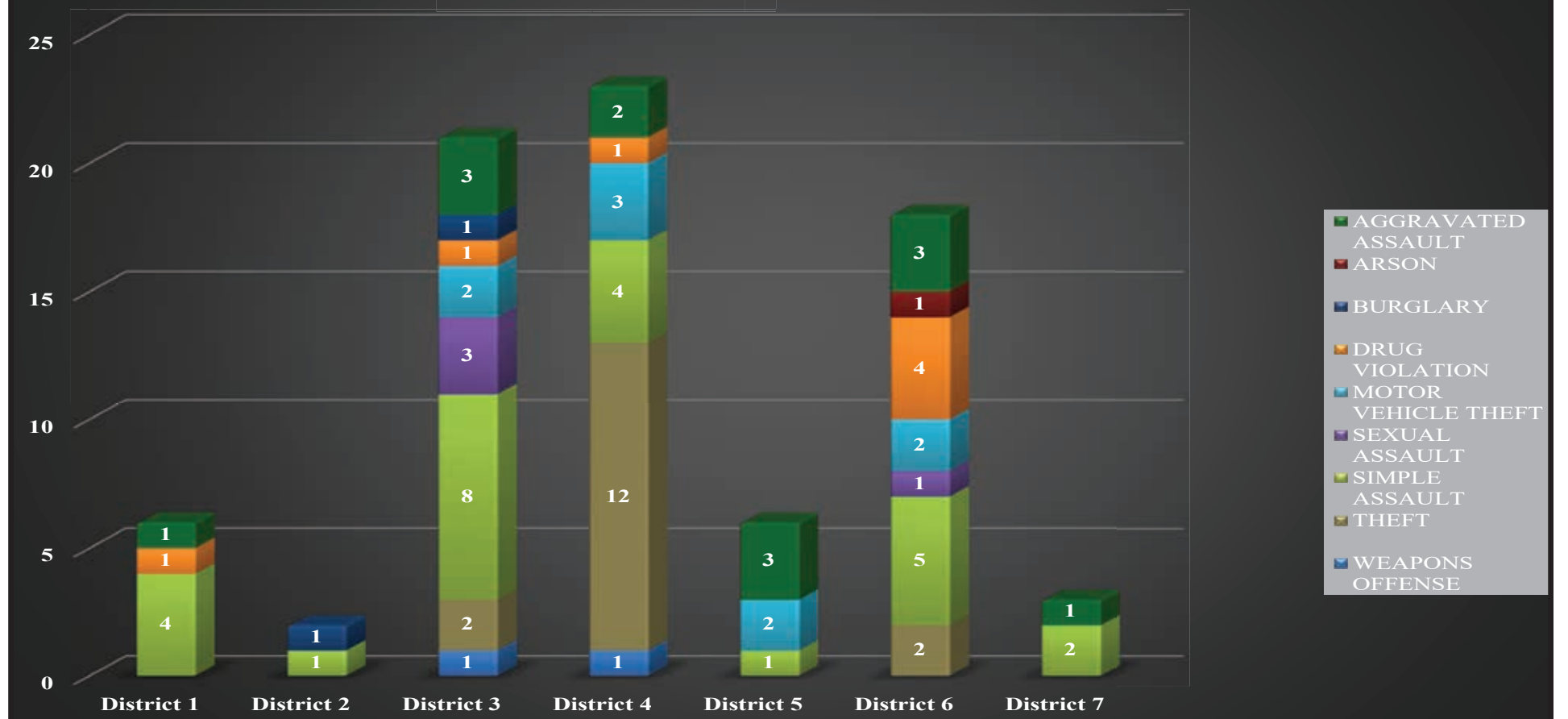
"The Community supports us and skateboarding, as you can see from all the skate parks, so as long as there's interest from the youth, we'll keep doing what we can," said Ringlero.

GRICUMA Gather for Holidays & Health

The GRIC Urban Members Association (GRICUMA) held its annual holiday luncheon on Saturday, Dec. 17. At the gathering, food, toys for children, COVID-19 testing, and COVID-19 and Flu vaccinations were made available. The yearly meeting drew close to 100 urban Community members for an excellent time to round out the year while delivering crucial vaccinations and boosters for public safety this winter.

“I’m very thankful that the Community always keep the GRICUMA members in mind when there are opportunities to bring these opportunities for our population,” said Dr. Anthony Newkirk, GRICUMA chairperson. “Gatherings like this allow us to spread that holiday spirit and show that GRIC is doing their part to support us and provide these public health services for us.”

Gov. Lewis worked with the GRIC Office of Emergency Management

(OEM) to coordinate the vaccinations and testing on Dec. 17.

Both parties saw the holiday gathering as a great opportunity to administer testing and vaccinations at once, a strategy that proved effective. In addition, the luncheon took place at Dr. Newkirk’s Warriors Code establishment in downtown Phoenix, making it accessible to the urban member population.

The COVID-19 testing and vaccinations portion of the gathering was made possible through a partnership with the GRIC OEM and the Arizona Dept. of Health Services.

“When the Arizona Dept. of Health Services said they have resources for the Community in the form of COVID-19 testing and vaccinations, the first thing thought of was the GRICUMA,” said Monica Ortiz, OEM. “The work our office mostly does, concerns the Community but I know that the urban members are also a priority that we need to work with so it great to provide this for them.”

Ortiz shared that vaccinations and testing were for all ages in attendance. She also noted that almost everyone that received a COVID vaccination was there for a second or third

booster. Booster vaccinations were reassuring for her as they demonstrated the need for the last shots for urban members when vaccination sites aren’t as

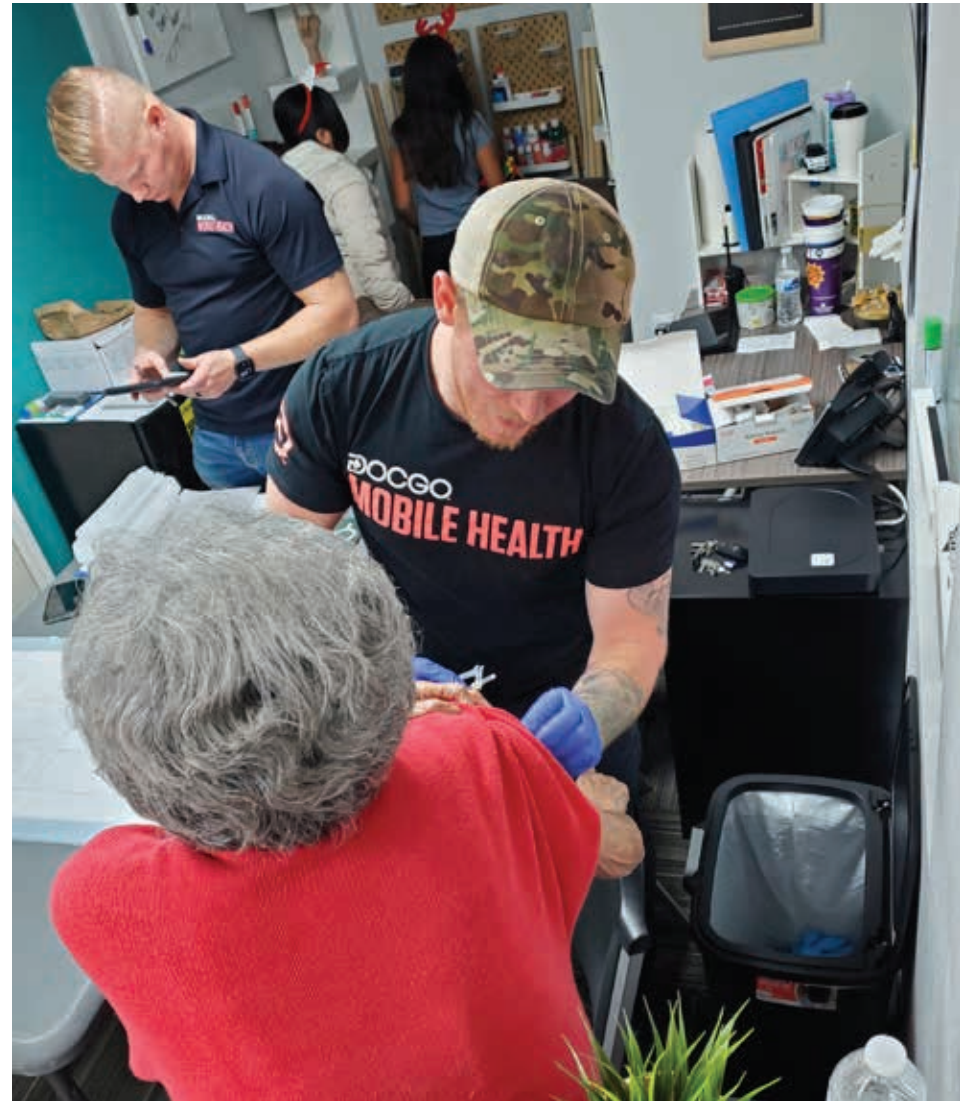
readily available or accessible.

Dr. Newkirk said another testing and vaccination event would soon occur in Casa Grande.

A sizable urban member population resides in Casa Grande, so OEM hopes to provide a similar event for those Community members this winter.

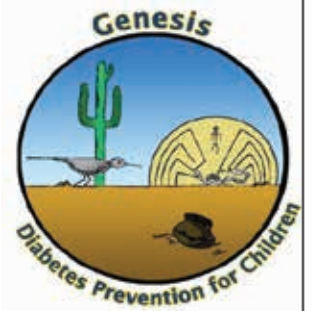

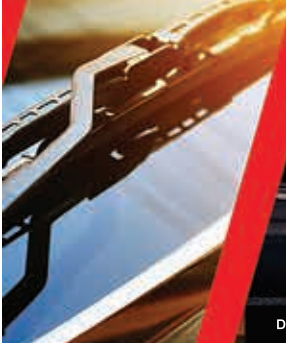
